VCU Annual Security and Fire Safety Report 2010



VCU Campus Police is the heart and soul of a coordinated program of safety that involves the entire campus and surrounding communities.



At Virginia Commonwealth University, keeping students, employees and visitors safe doesn't stop at the traditional campus borders. Instead, VCU Campus Police, an accredited Virginia Law Enforcement Professional Standards Commission agency — in partnership with Richmond City Police and community leaders — has aggressively expanded its outreach efforts in surrounding neighborhoods.

The ability to patrol in neighboring communities has fostered a new level of security for the on-campus community as well as for those who live and work in the areas surrounding the campuses. These efforts began in 1998 with routine patrols that carry officers into neighborhoods adjacent to both campuses where Campus Police has jurisdiction to monitor and make arrests.

Campus Police also recognizes that a cornerstone of effective policing is knowing the community. VCU officers have initiated an adopt-an-elder project in Carver, a neighborhood just north of VCU's Monroe Park Campus. Through the project, which is part of a federal grant that has supported hiring more officers to patrol the neighborhood, Campus Police has built new relationships that enable the department to address the needs of elders and protect a segment of the Carver community that may be forgotten.

Another Campus Police initiative is aimed at keeping campus drug crime at low levels. Building on its commitment to involve everyone at the University in crime prevention, Campus Police uses both patrols and education to reach the goal of making our expanded environment drug free.

On campus, VCU initiatives include security systems that limit access to many campus residence halls and buildings, and an expanded bicycle patrol that provides quick response on campus and in surrounding communities.

Campus Police provides services to keep you safe.

Emergency Reporting Telephone System

Exterior yellow and interior red telephones at 323 sites across both campuses allow electronic contact with Campus Police. An officer will be dispatched immediately to the site.

Access control

Employees and students can swipe their VCUCards, the universal campus identification card, into readers at designated building entrances. A magnetic strip on the card identifies users and allows the encoded reader to open the door only to individuals with proper authority.

Motorcycle officers

To help keep traffic moving smoothly, VCU officers patrol on motorcycles. Campus Police dedicates an officer to each campus during weekdays, particularly as new construction projects create changes in traffic patterns.

Escort service

For safety, Security Escort Services are available to accompany VCU students, faculty and staff to their cars, classes or homes located within a defined area near campus. Call 828-WALK (9255) from anywhere on campus or activate a yellow emergency telephone.

Bicycle patrol

Having the state's largest campus bike patrol enables officers to respond quickly to calls for service. Campus Police is currently increasing the number of officers certified for bicycle patrol.

Defense Systems against rape

Rape Aggression Defense Systems teaches women — both students and employees — how to escape from threatening situations.

Bicycle registration

As part of the department's education program, Campus Police officers help students and employees register their bicycles to deter theft.

How VCU protects you

VCU Campus Police

VCU has authorized the operation of a full-time, professionally trained police department, responsible for the safety and welfare of all members of the University community and their guests. VCU Campus Police is committed to providing a safe and secure learning environment.

Campus Police enforces all state laws and University regulations, and prevents, detects and investigates any criminal activity on the campus. Campus Police is managed by a Chief of Police who is responsible for providing law enforcement service to the VCU community. Campus Police officers have the same authority and obligation to exercise police power as other state and municipal police officers. Campus Police jurisdiction includes all University-owned, leased and controlled property and the adjacent streets and sidewalks. Campus Police also maintains a mutual aid agreement with the Richmond Police Department.

Campus Police officers are sworn and certified by the Virginia Department of Criminal Justice Services. All 82 campus police officers have completed 600 hours of law enforcement training from VCU's certified criminal justice training academy and are required to complete 40 hours of in-service training biennially. Campus Police utilize the Richmond Police Department and the Virginia State Police in the event additional police resources are needed on campus.

Located at 938 W. Grace St., Campus Police maintains regular business hours, Monday through Friday, from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Copies of police reports are available, and recovered property can be collected during business

hours. After-hours contact may be made through the Campus Police Communication Center. The emergency telephone number is 828-1234 and the non-emergency number is 828-1196. Campus Police may also be contacted by activating one of the emergency call boxes located on campus.

Academic security

Campus Police is assisted in its mission by academic security personnel. This auxiliary force is not empowered to make arrests nor carry firearms; however, they assist the uniformed police officers in a variety of ways, such as building security, property checks and added visibility within the community.

Security personnel oversee building security at various academic buildings. Security personnel are charged with providing additional visual presence at various campus locations. They are responsible for checking faculty, student and staff identification, signing in visitors and conducting property checks of campus buildings. Security personnel are in constant contact with Campus Police via radio communications or through the Emergency Reporting Telephone System.

Housing security

The VCU Department of Residential Life and Housing operates 14 residence halls. Each residence hall is staffed 24 hours a day with trained student security personnel employed by Campus Police. All residents must enter their respective facility through the main entrance. Exterior doors are locked and can only be opened with VCUCard access, which is granted to authorized personnel. Security personnel verify the identification of each



resident who enters the building and also oversee guest sign-in for each facility. Guests must surrender valid photo identification, i.e., local, state or federal government identification with a current expiration date. Security personnel keep guest identifications at the security post until the guest signs out.

For policy violations or emergencies, security personnel may contact Campus Police using the police radio or Emergency Reporting Telephone System.

Security personnel complete an 18-hour block of training. All security personnel are required to pass a written exam at the conclusion of the training.

Safety awareness

Crime-prevention specialists offer strategies to help the campus community stay safe and prevent crime. Police officers also give safety presentations during orientations for both new students and employees. For information and presentations on the Monroe Park Campus, call 828-4395. For the MCV Campus, call 828-8730.

Community policing

Community policing involves all students and employees in crime prevention. Officers provide a range of services, including security inspections of facilities, presentations on personal safety tips and recommendations for safety measures. Call 828-1196 for more details.

Investigations

Campus Police investigators are fully sworn officers authorized to make arrests and investigate any crimes at VCU. They welcome your questions or any information that could help solve a crime. Just call 828-6409.

Victim/witness services

VCU Campus Police is here to help take care of your needs. Ask for any counseling, medical or academic help if you are a victim or witness. For more information call 828-8696.

Informing you

VCU Campus Police is committed to providing timely warnings to the University community about potential threats to students or employees. Information is provided regularly through the Commonwealth Times, the student newspaper; the VCU TelegRAM for faculty and staff; broadcast e-mails to all students, faculty and staff; and online at www.vcu.edu/police/advisory. In addition, the daily incident log is available for review at the VCU Campus Police headquarters or at www.vcu.edu/police/CrimeReporting.

Campus security enhancements

VCU has implemented a multi-channel communications system to keep students, faculty and staff informed, safe and secure.

- In the event of an emergency, 10 sirens on VCU's two campuses will sound, alerting students, faculty, staff, patients, visitors and the surrounding communities to seek shelter.

- VCU's text message alert system will notify students, faculty, staff and parents immediately about campus emergencies. It will also be used to report weather delays and cancellations. Registration is free. To sign up, visit www.vcu.edu/alert/notify.
- During an emergency, Alertus devices in classrooms, residence halls and other high-traffic areas on VCU's campuses will emit an alarm and a flashing strobe-light warning and will provide emergency information on the units' large-text digital displays.
- Digital signboards in major academic buildings and residence hall lobbies will provide immediate information during campus emergencies.
- The VCU Alert website at www.vcu.edu/alert will be updated regularly with information and instructions on how to respond should an emergency occur.



Things you can do

If someone tries to harm you

- Stay calm and think rationally.
- Remember what the attacker looks like.
- Consider what you can do to defend yourself.

At home and in your hall

- Always lock your doors and windows.
- Be careful when inviting casual acquaintances into your home or office.
- Do not allow anyone to duplicate your keys.

On the phone

- List only first initials and last name in directories.
- Do not divulge your name and address to people you don't know.
- Hang up immediately on obscene phone callers.
- Never reveal that you are alone.

In your car

- Lock your doors and windows.
- Park in well-lit areas.
- Store valuables out of sight and lock them in the trunk when the car is parked.
- If your car breaks down, activate emergency flashers.

- Stay in the locked car.
- If someone stops to help, ask the person to call for help for you.
- Sound the horn if threatened.
- Never pick up hitchhikers.

If you live off campus

- Re-key locks when moving into a previously rented residence or after keys have been lost or stolen.
- Install deadbolt locks on all exterior doors and locks on windows.
- Make sure shrubbery is trimmed away from entryways and windows.
- Light entrances all night long.

State sex offender registry

The Campus Sex Crimes Prevention Act of 2000 mandates that institutions of higher education alert faculty, staff and students where they can obtain information concerning registered sex offenders that may frequent a campus. Reporting a crime

Located at 938A W. Grace St., the VCU Campus Police Emergency Communications Center is open around-the-clock every day of the week. Individuals can report crimes at the center or by calling 828-1234. The Emergency Reporting Telephone System — the yellow exterior and red interior telephones located at 323 sites across both campuses — allows electronic contact with VCU Campus Police, and an officer will be dispatched immediately to the site. Confidential reporting will protect the identity of those reporting crimes to the extent that the law allows. To report crimes anonymously, please call 828-1234 (emergency) or 828-1196 (non-emergency). For online confidential reporting, visit www.vcu.edu/police and click “Report a Crime Anonymously.”

Securing access to facilities

More than 200 buildings are owned or occupied by VCU. Access to facilities is managed in a variety of ways, according to use, size and other factors. Among the latest security strategies is an electronic access-control system that works with the VCUCard, the universal campus identification card. Faculty, staff and students can swipe their VCUCards into card readers at designated building entrances; a magnetic strip on the card identifies the user and allows the encoded reader to open the door only to those individuals with proper authority.

Campus law enforcement

The VCU Campus Police is a state-accredited agency and received accreditation from the Virginia Law Enforcement Professional Standards Commission in February 2008. The VCU Campus Police includes 82 professional police officers

assisted by approximately 60 nonsworn security personnel. Police officers complete a 15-week basic training academy and a 13-week field training program to earn state certification. VCU Police officers are empowered by the Code of Virginia. The University’s armed police officers have the same authority to detain and arrest as municipal police officers. Unarmed security officers do not make arrests; their presence and observations assist the work of the patrol division.

Missing student policy

All students residing in an on-campus student housing facility have the option of identifying a contact person or persons whom the University will notify if the student is determined missing by the VCU Campus Police or the local law enforcement agency. The contact information will be confidential, accessible only to authorized campus officials and law enforcement, and may not be disclosed outside a missing person investigation. When a student who resides in an on-campus student housing facility is determined to have been missing for 24 hours, the University will:

- Notify a contact person within 24 hours if the student has designated one;
- Notify the student’s custodial parent or guardian and/or any other designated contact person within 24 hours if the student is under 18 years of age and is not emancipated; and
- Inform the local law enforcement agency that has jurisdiction in the area that the student is missing within 24 hours.

The University will ensure that all students are able to update their contact information

when needed. These procedures and form are communicated routinely to students by e-mail during new student orientation, residence hall meetings and the start of fall and spring semesters. Timely warning policy

The timely warning is triggered when VCU Campus Police identify an incident that poses an ongoing threat to students, faculty, staff and guests. The decision to inform the community shall be based upon the known facts of the incident. The Senior Vice President for Finance and Administration, in consultation with the Chief of Police, will decide whether to inform the VCU community of incidents or conditions that may present a threat or risk to members of the University community. Such timely warning provides opportunity for individuals to take reasonable precautions for their safety.

Timely warning incidents

The University community will be notified of incidents that represent a serious or continuing threat. The incidents may stem from reports to VCU Campus Police or other state or local agencies. Those incidents which prompt a timely notification could include, but are not limited to:

- Murder
- Non-negligent manslaughter
- Forcible sexual offenses

- Robbery
- Aggravated assault
- Arson
- Missing person

Notification process

The Chief of Police or senior police officer on duty will inform the Senior Vice President for Finance and Administration of any incident that may pose a significant threat to the personal safety of students, staff, patients or visitors.

The Senior Vice President for Finance and Administration, in consultation with the Chief of Police, will determine whether the incident requires a warning, and will promptly notify the VCU and VCU Health System communities of the:

- Nature of the incident or immediate threat
- Location, date and time of incident
- Description of any suspect(s)
- Action recommended for University members
- Crime prevention information
- Contact number for the VCU Campus Police

Daily incident log

VCU Campus Police will maintain an incident log that will be posted daily to the VCU Campus Police website. The log will include the nature, date, time and general location of incidents reported, as well as the disposition of the complaint, if that is known at the time the log is created.



VCU Campus Police reserves the right to exclude crime report information from the log in circumstances where posting may compromise ongoing police operations. Faculty, staff and students are encouraged to review the incident log periodically to become more familiar with the types and locations of incidents which may impact the University and VCU Health System communities. Anyone with information warranting a timely warning should report the circumstances to the VCU Campus Police by phone at 828-1234 or in person at VCU Campus Police headquarters located at 938 W. Emergency notification, response and evacuation policy (See chart on Page 28.)

In accordance with the University's Emergency Preparedness Plan (EPP), University officials will coordinate the emergency notification, response and evacuation of the community, as needed, in the event of an emergency. These officials will also test the emergency response and evacuation procedures annually and publicize them throughout the community. Individuals who are responsible for carrying out these procedures include, but are not limited to the:

- President of the University
- Senior Vice President for Finance and Administration (Incident Commander under the EPP)

- Chief of Police and the VCU Campus Police
- Associate Vice President for Facilities Management (acting as Deputy Incident Commander under the EPP)

Activation of emergency notification system will occur immediately upon confirmation of a significant emergency or dangerous situation occurring on VCU's campuses involving an immediate threat to the health and safety of students, faculty and staff, so that they may take reasonable precautions for their safety. The decision is made by the Senior Vice President for Finance and Administration, in consultation with the Chief of Police.

In situations when the Senior Vice President for Finance and Administration or Chief of Police are not available, or where any delay to brief these officials would significantly increase the risk to the VCU community, the on-duty police commander is authorized to activate the emergency notification system.

Emergency evacuation procedures

VCU Campus Police shall be responsible for the safe evacuation of all persons utilizing VCU and VCU Health System facilities in the event of fire, bomb threat, power outage, other natural disasters, civil disturbances and active threats. The level of necessity will determine the response by VCU Campus Police. If large-scale events occur that are beyond the resource capabilities of VCU Campus Police and the University, officials will request assistance from outside agencies such as the Richmond Police and Fire and Emergency departments, state police, and Richmond and state departments of emergency management.

Testing and exercise procedures

In accordance with the 2010 VCU Continuity of Operations Plan (COOP), VCU will utilize these procedures for testing emergency notification, response and evacuation.

- Training, testing and exercises
To maintain the University's emergency management capability, an all-hazard COOP training, testing and exercise program was established in 2004. VCU annually certifies completion of plans updates and execution of tests on COOP plans in the event of natural or man-made disasters, including terrorist attacks. Both University emergency response and facility evacuation procedures are publicized and are tested at least annually.
- After Action Review and Improvement Plan
After Action Reviews (AAR) will be conducted following each emergency event or exercise on a planning scenario. The formal AAR should be completed on emergency events and exercises within 60 days. Improvement plans will be included or recommended in formal AAR documents. COOP or EPP modifications surfaced by the AAR process will be responsively made to applicable response plans.

Mass notification systems

The University utilizes a multi-channel communications system to provide timely

warnings to the VCU and VCU Health System communities. In the event of an impending or actual emergency on campus, one or more of the following communication channels will be activated:

- **Outdoor siren system** consists of 10 sirens strategically located on the Monroe Park Campus and the MCV Campus. Siren tests are performed monthly.
- **The VCU Alert website, www.vcu.edu/alert**, is updated regularly with information and instructions about how to respond in an emergency situation. A link to the site can be found on the University's website homepage.
- **Alertus** devices in classrooms and high-volume areas transmit audio and visual alerts, as well as 80-character messages.
- **Text messaging** provides personal communication to all cell phone users who register for the service. In addition to emergency communications, text messages will be used to announce closings and delays for inclement weather. Students, faculty, staff and parents can sign up for text messaging at www.vcu.edu/alert/notify.
- **Digital screens** in major academic buildings, the University Student Commons and all residence halls on both campuses will be used to provide visual alerts similar to those displayed on the VCU Alert website.
- **E-mail** will be used to send more detailed information to everyone with a VCU e-mail account.



Alcohol consumption and distribution policy

The VCU Insider, a resource guide published by the Division of Student Affairs and Enrollment Services, includes the “VCU Alcohol and Drug Policy,” which governs the sale, possession and consumption of alcohol at social events sponsored by student groups. These procedures incorporate the legal requirements of the Virginia Department of Alcoholic Beverage Control, which requires a person to be 21 years of age to drink alcoholic beverages. It is unlawful to serve or sell alcohol to persons under age 21.

Student affairs officials will notify parents of underage students found guilty of campus alcohol or substance abuse violations. This policy applies to students under age 21 and claimed as dependents by their parents.

Drug-free schools and workplace policy

In accordance with the federal Drug-Free Workplace Act of 1988, the federal Drug-Free Schools and Communities Act of 1989 and the state Policy on Alcohol and Other Drugs, VCU prohibits the unlawful or unauthorized manufacture, distribution, dispensation, possession or use of alcohol and other drugs by employees and students in the workplace, on University property or as part of any campus activity. Employee or student violators are subject to disciplinary action, up to and including termination of employment, expulsion, referral for prosecution and referral to an evaluation or rehabilitation program.

Substance abuse education

In addition to assessment, counseling, education and referral services available from University Student Health Services and University Counseling Services, several other VCU programs provide specific kinds of assistance, including education, information and treatment.

VCU Wellness Resource Center, 815 S. Cathedral Place, 828-WELL (9355). The office provides a variety of programs, including:

- Substance Abuse Education and Prevention, 828-2086. Provides substance abuse prevention and educational programs including a free basic alcohol education class. Staff members present in classes and residence halls, collaborate with student organizations to conduct educational activities and act as resources to any faculty, student or staff member who would like information on substance abuse prevention.
- Project R.E.A.C.H. Peers: These peers are students trained by a professional staff member to provide educational sessions on topics regarding chemical health and substance abuse prevention. To contact a Project R.E.A.C.H. Peer, call 828-6919.

Sexual assault

VCU is committed to preventing sexual assault. VCU Campus Police, University Counseling Services, Sexual Assault and Domestic Violence Services and the Wellness Resource Center are among organizations that offer programs concerning sexual assault. Programs include safety information, self-defense training through the Rape Aggression Defense Systems classes and counseling. Guidelines also are in place to protect employees from sexual assault.

Responding to sexual assault

- Individuals who have been sexually assaulted should call VCU Campus Police immediately. The coordinator of Sexual Assault and Domestic Violence Services or other requested person will be contacted to provide support and counseling. The officer will take a report and encourage the survivor to be examined by a sexual assault nurse examiner, who is specially trained in preserving evidence. Whenever possible, the case will be forwarded to the Office of the Commonwealth’s Attorney for prosecution.
- Survivors also may choose administrative disciplinary action. Those who do not wish to file an official police report may file an anonymous third-party report through Sexual Assault and Domestic Violence Services or other offices within the Division of Student Affairs and Enrollment Services. An anonymous case cannot be investigated for prosecution, but it alerts police to the incident.

Peer education

Students receive training from the Wellness Resource Center to present information to student organizations, academic classes and at special events. For details about joining the group or scheduling a presentation, call the coordinator of Sexual Assault and Domestic Violence Services at 828-2085.

Administrative moves

VCU reserves the right to reassign a student in the event of emergencies and health-related epidemics and when issues of safety, health, maintenance or student conduct are involved. An administrative move cannot be appealed. VCU retains the right to control student rooms and assignments, as stated in housing contracts.



Disciplinary procedures

Students facing on-campus disciplinary procedures regarding sexual misconduct, rape, acquaintance rape or other sex offenses, forcible or nonforcible, will be handled in accordance with the provisions of the "Rules and Procedures of VCU" and the "Student Sexual Misconduct Policy." Persons found guilty will be subject to penalties and/or other disciplinary actions as outlined in the "Rules and Procedures of VCU." Classified employees and faculty also may be subject to penalties under other University policies and guidelines. The penalties and other disciplinary actions include: censure; probation; public service and/or educational experience; separation and dismissal; interim suspension; reinstatement after separation or dismissal; and penalties against a licensee or invitee.

Procedures for on-campus disciplinary hearings in cases of alleged sexual assault outline that the hearing format provide:

1. Hearings related to charges of sexual misconduct will be closed, unless both the accused and the accuser agree to admitting

observers. If the accused and the accuser agree that observers may be admitted, each may select up to four observers. No hearing of charges related to sexual misconduct will be open to the University community.

2. Within five days (excluding weekends and official University holidays) of the hearing's conclusion, the chair of the University Hearing Board shall, in writing, notify the accused, the accuser and the administrator receiving the charges of the decision.

- All residence halls are fully equipped with sprinklers with quick-response heads. Gladding Residence Center I and II are protected by limited-area sprinkler systems located in rooms adjacent to stairwells, mechanical rooms and store rooms.
- Fire safety and prevention training is provided for all students and residence hall staff throughout the year during orientation, University functions and special events. Throughout the year, a variety of fire and life safety education opportunities are presented to residential students. Additional training is available upon request.
- Upon discovery of a fire, students and staff are trained to activate the fire alarm and exit the building immediately using the closest safe exit and proceed to the predetermined meeting place for that building. It is against the law to remain in a building during a nonscheduled or emergency fire alarm. Residents who do not evacuate in a timely manner or fail to adhere to instructions given by emergency personnel will be subject to disciplinary action.
- The Code of Virginia requires four fire drills per year, which the University meets. One drill must take place within 10 days of the commencement of the fall semester. One drill must take place before sunrise and one after sunset.

EMERGENCY PROCEDURES

REMAIN CALM

Evacuation

- Follow directions of authorities.
- Secure hazardous materials or equipment.
- Take personal belongings (keys, purses, wallets, cell phones, etc.
- Use the nearest exit or an alternate exit if it is blocked.
- **DO NOT** use elevators!
- Assist persons with disabilities or special needs.
- Account for individuals.

Shelter in Place

You may be safer where you are.

- Stay quiet and calm.
- Pay attention to your surroundings.
- Follow directions of authorities.

Fire

- Activate the nearest fire alarm.
- Evacuate the building.
- Call **804-828-1234**.
- **DO NOT** re-enter the building until authorized by emergency personnel.

Tornado

TORNADO WATCH: means conditions are favorable for a tornado; remain alert to weather conditions and reports.

TORNADO WARNING: means a tornado has been sighted; warnings are typically available 3 — 15 minutes in advance of the tornado.

- Go to an internal, lowest area of safety: hallway or basement that is away from windows and glass.
- **DO NOT** use elevators during a tornado warning. Persons with mobility concerns should go to a safe place at the time of a tornado watch; **DO NOT** wait for a tornado warning!
- Close all doors, including main corridors.
- Crouch near the floor or under heavy, well-supported objects and cover your head.
- If outside, move to nearest sturdy building, or lie down in a low area such as a ditch and cover your head.
- Be alert for fire and use the fire plan as needed.

Explosion

- Evacuate the building as quickly and calmly as possible.
- Call **804-828-1234**.
- If items are falling, get under a sturdy table or desk.
- If fire is present, stay low to the floor and exit the building as quickly as possible.
- If trapped in debris, tap on a pipe or wall to alert rescuers.
- Help others exit the building and move to designated evacuation areas.
- Untrained persons should not try to rescue people who are inside a collapsed building; wait for emergency personnel.

Infrastructure Failure

- In case of water, power, heat or cooling outages, call Facilities Management Physical Plant Operations at **804-828-9444**. For outages in VCU Health System, call Service Response Center at **804-628-4772**.
- In case of internal telephone systems outages at VCU and VCU Health System, use cellular phone to call **804-828-2227**.
- In case of a critical incident relating to computer systems, call the Technology Services Help Desk at **804-828-2227**. In case of a VCU Health System critical incident related to computer systems, call **804-828-6447**.

Hazardous Materials Release

For major spills:

- Call **911**.
- Evacuate, assemble at a safe distance, and designate someone to communicate with the Fire Department.
- Notify emergency personnel if you have been exposed, or have information about the spill.

For all spills: Immediately call Environmental Health and Safety at **804-828-9834**, or Physical Plant Operations at **804-828-9364** during non-business hours.

Suspicious Person

- **DO NOT** let anyone into a locked building/office, or “tailgate” behind you into the building.
- **DO NOT** confront the person.
- **DO NOT** block the person’s exit.
- Call **804-828-1234**. Provide all possible information.

Suspicious Object

- **DO NOT** touch or disturb the object.
- Call **804-828-1234**.
- Be prepared to evacuate.

Violent Incident

- If you know the location of an assailant or danger, consider escaping if a safe escape route is immediately available to you. Call **804-828-1234** when safe.

If it is unsafe to escape:

- Immediately seek protection.
- Secure area by locking or barricading door using whatever means available.
- Stay behind solid objects, away from door.
- Call **804-828-1234**.
- Minimize noise that may draw attention to your location: turn off lights, computers, radios, and put cell phones on vibrate.
- Follow all directions of authorities; **DO NOT** challenge law enforcement.
